Explorations in Language and Law is an internationally peer-reviewed, interdisciplinary series that publishes research articles, comments, review articles and book reviews on the interface between Language and Law in academic, professional and institutional settings. While the main focus of the series is to address theoretical and applied issues from a combined language-and-law discourse perspective, the series also takes a broader view by analysing the ways in which law cuts across other specific disciplines (namely, Law and Economics, Law and Politics, Law and Sociology, Law and Psychology, Law and Religion, and Law and Medicine) where the language-discourse component is involved. The series welcomes original, high-quality research (both diachronic and synchronic) on English and other European as well as non-European languages, cultures and systems, and encourages a variety of theories, methods and approaches by serving as a research tool across the disciplines of applied linguistics, communication, rhetoric, philosophy, and law studies. As such, the series aims to promote a genuinely interdisciplinary debate on the ways in which the relationships between Language and Law or between Law and other Disciplines play themselves out in theory and practice for an international readership of academics, researchers or practitioners from different disciplinary backgrounds.
